

An avid reader herself, she's always been attracted by the Fantastic Literature and, for 4 years, she'se been the *Harry Potter* official expert for one of the biggest italian portals, *SuperevaDada* (afterwards an international portal with branches in *UK*, *Usa Germany, France, Spain, Portugal, Belgium, Austria, Brazil, Australia, China, Hungary, The Netherlands and Canada*), for which she wrote several hundreds of articles.

For more than 8 years she's been part of the editorial staff at *FantasyMagazine*, the biggest italian on line magazine devoted to the Fantastic genre, for which she wrote over one thousand articles (http://www.fantasymagazine.it/collaboratori/65/marina-lenti).

Throughout the years she's given many lectures, has partecipated to many panels and has written several book essays on those same subjects (see her bibliography below).

She's been also the continuity editor for the italian translation of the most famous *Harry Potter* encyclopaedia in English language, '*The Lexicon – An unauthorized guide to Harry Potter fiction and related materials*' by *Steve Vander Ark* (published in Italy by Piemme).

*2006 - 'L'Incantesimo Harry Potter' (The Harry Potter Spell) - Delos Books

For 3 weeks this book was among the top 5 bestselling essays in the **International Book Shop** (www.ibs.it) list. At the time, IBS was the biggest italian on line books store which could be now compared to Amazon.it. The essay also won the **Premio Italia 2007**, the most prestigious italian award dedicated to Fantastic, Fantasy and Science Fiction literature. The essay was reprinted (and updated) in November 2007 and it's been included in the bibliography of academic works from the Universities of **Roma**, **Palermo**, **Modena** and **Reggio Emilia**, as well as in several other italian book essays about **Harry Potter**.

*2007 - 'Harry Potter a test' (The Harry Potter Quiz Book) - Alphatest

A didactic and entertaining manual, which was reprinted (and updated) in 2008. The book was also published and further updated in **France** in 2009 as **The Monde de Harry P.** (Belin publisher).

A final updated version with added charades and games will see the light in 2019 for Runa Editrice.

*2011 - 'Potterologia' (Potterology) - Camelozampa

Inventor and curator of this multi-author short essays anthology to which she contributed with the essay '*The fountain of fair fortune: an alchemical metaphor about the meaning of life*'. All the royalties are donated to the charity Theodora, that supports hospitalized children and their families through the 'clown therapy'. The book was reprinted (and updated) in 2016.

*2011 - 'Code di Stampa' (a wordplay which literally means 'Print Queue', but in Italian also means 'Printed Tails ') - La Gru

Inventor and curator of this multi-author novels anthology about animals, to which she contributed with the novel '*Brave*', and whose royalties are donated to a charity called Save the dogs and the other animals which helps the strays and the mistreated animals in Romania.

*2012 - 'La Metafisica di Harry Potter' (The Harry Potter Metaphysics) - Camelozampa

A book essay devoted to the supernatural themes of the saga, to which she dedicated more than four years of study and research. The book won a nomination at the **Premio Italia 2013**.

*2015 - 'Harry Potter: il cibo come strumento letterario' (Harry Potter: the food as a literary tool) - Runa Editrice A book essay that analyses the various 'roles' which J.K. Rowling made the food play throughout the novels.

*2016 – Il Fantastico nella letteratura per ragazzi (The Fantastic genre in Kids Literature) – Runa Editrice Inventor and curator of this multi-author short essays anthology, to which she contributed with the essay 'I'm fighting to win and I'm fighting with what I have', devoted to the Last Elf saga written by the most popular italian author in the genre, Silvana De Mari.

*2016 - Hobbitologia' (Hobbitology) - Camelozampa

Inventor and co-curator of this multi-author short essays anthology, to which she contributed with the essay '*The food role in The Hobbit*'. A collection of essays on **The Hobbit**, the first novel by **Tolkien**, recently brought to the screen with **Peter Jackson**'s trilogy.

FOR THOSE WHO BELIEVE IT...

Walter Semkiv, an american doctor and a passionate researcher of 'famous reincarnations', affirms in one of his studies that J.K Rowling would be none other than the well known writer Charls Dickens reincarnated. The 'tip' would come through some medianic sessions by Kevin Ryerson, who channels an entity called Ahtun Re.

5. J.K.Rowling immediately dismissed as a fabrication her cousin Ben Rowling's claim to be the ispiration for Harry (right answer: **4**). But he didn't give up and, in March 2005, he even put himself through a truth test in a reality show called Lie Detector.

With very little surprise on behalf of the Potter fans, Ben overcame the test, which doesn't really prove anything but the fact he is actually sure of having been the inspiration for the Harry Potter character. He told the media he used to be an inseparable mate of the writer, when they were little: «I know Jo based Harry on me. I can see so much of the young me in his character. We used to spend the weekends swapping stories of boarding school life. She was always fascinated about what I had been up to at school and used to love me telling her about the scrapes and escapades I had been involved in».

- **24.** Between Joanne Rowling e Stephenie Meyer there are more than ten years in terms of age. The story of their lives, before success came, are deeply different: rather hard the first one's, pretty tranquil the second one's. Comparing their publishing stories, instead, there are more similiarities than differences: both got their inspiration from a certain kind of 'vision' (a daydream for Rowling, a proper night dream for Meyer); both have talked about their novels to their sisters; both wrote steadily while having little children to look after; both got an average of a dozen of rejection letters sent from agents/publishers; both have been picked up (or 'revived', in Rowling's case) by chance, from the so called 'slush pile', that is from the pile of unsolicited manuscripts from the publishers/agents; both, finally, obtained a huge success worldwide and have seen their books transferred on screen. Even the names of their 'pygmalions' partially fit with, in a bizarre game of coincidences: Rowling found an agent in Christopher Little, Meyer a publisher in Little & Brown (who, by the way, later became also the publisher of the first Rowling's post-Potter novel!). Nethertheless, Rowling received, as an advance payment, only 1500 pounds, while Meyer 750.000 dollars, that is almost 495.000 pounds (right answer: **D**)

THE DARK MARK

The image of the skull, with the snake coming out from the mouth, recalls one of the symbols present in the Rosicrucian book-manifesto 'The alchemical wedding of Christian Rosenkreutz. In fact, on the fourth of the seven days such text is divided into, the protagonist describes an altar where some full of symbolism objects are displayed: among them there's just a skull from whose eye orbits the head and the tail of a snake peep out.

21. Philip Treacy, an Irishman born in 1967, began working – after his studies at the Dublin National College of Art & Design - with Stephen Jones (whose name's listed as one of the other possible reply choices among other famous londoner milliners) and obtained his first success in 1988, after creating the hat for the wedding gown of the «Tatler Magazine» style editor. For ten years he's been working with Karl Lagerfeld at the Chanel maison and afterwards with Givenchy, while top models like Naomi Campbell, Stella Tennant and Christy Turlington posed for him in exchange for free hats. Among his clients there are some britsh royal family members and Treacy has also created the hat for the wedding gown of Camilla Parker Bowles, who married Prince Charles. He has exhibited his creations in Florence, London, Paris, Dublin and Milan.

Temime told at first the designer was hesitant in taking on the Potter job, but then he accepted saying his main reason to do so was gaining the respect of his little niece (right answer: **D**).

- **29.** According to what Pliny the Elder writes in his Naturalis Historia, basilisk's dimensions are rather small. In the passage devoted to this animal (viii, 33) we can actually read its length is no more than twelves fingers. As the roman measure of one finger (digitus) corresponds, in the metric decimal system, to about 18,5 centimeters, it means that the maximum length of a basilisk can be 222 centimeters, that is a little more than two metres. In the film, instead, the basilisk is 80 feets long, that is 24 meters and 38 centimeters (right answer: **A**)
- **47.** At the fountain's corners there are four statues depicting an eagle with a snake in its beak (right answer: **C**). AN INCENDIARY HOGWARTS

Pat Acton's challenge's really peculiar... This eccentric Iowa man has actually built up, using matches, a perfect replica of the Hogwarts castle, just as it's been showed through the film released by Warner Bros.

The artwork has required three years of patience and self-abnegation, a well as half a million matches and more than sixty-eight litres of glue.

In the past, Acton had already built up a gigantic replica of the Enterprise starship from the Star Trek series, as well as a Shuttle and a Capitol Hill's replicas. You can see his creations at the following URL: http://matchstickmarvels.com/index.php/the-model

- **4.** As part of the normal support to the astronauts during long stay space flights, NASA accepted the request of William McArthur, the captain of the International Space Station, for a preview screening of the 'Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire' film. The space agency has therefore asked Warner Bros for the license for a space streaming, to the great satisfaction of the prestigious cosmic fan of the boy wizard (right answer: **B**). Inside the Station there's already a library with dvds, books, cds and other multimedia material to help the astronauts chilling out during the few free moments allowed by their busy schedule.
- **21.** For many years, in the belgian city of Bruges has been held a festival devoted to snow and ice sculptures (right answer: *A*).

The 2008 edition contemplated a series of artworks inspired to magic and, of course, a tribute to the most magical tale of all times couldn't be missed out: for example, there have been on display iced statues of Harry Potter and Albus Dumbledore, 'magical' animals like cats and snakes and even striking tools like broomsticks, skulls and ancient magic books illuminated by peculiar chandeliers made of ... ice crystals! Globally, to bring these frozen wonders to life, fourty artists have been using three hundred tons of ice and four hundred tons of fresh snow.

The exhibition, inaugurated on November the 20th, has been kept open until the 11th of January of the following year.

25. The higest bet accepted for Cho Chang was one hundred pounds and many people wagered at least half of that sum (right answer: *C*). The betters were so numerous to force the bookmakers to downgrade the ratings for the ex Harry Potter sweetheart, decreasing from an «eight against one» to a «three against one». At a later stage, after the theft of a copy of the 'Harry Potter and the Half-blood Prince' book, which took place one and a half month before the official pubblication, the trend had changed and an avalanche of bets had been poured on Dumbledore: at that point the bookmakers blocked the bet, because it was clear there had been a leak.

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
